HSC Results 2021

Many students achieved Bands 5 and 6 across many different subjects. Of note is our Extension 1 Mathematics class with all seven students in the class achieving a Band 6 (the top band). Congratulations to our 2021 HSC group. Our HSC Achievers and their parents will be invited back in early Term 3 to celebrate the wonderful achievements of our 2021 HSC class.

Vaping

Vaping continues to be an issue among our young people. We take this issue seriously due to the negative health effects vaping can have on young people, who are often unaware of the risks associated with the practice. It is also illegal to possess vapes without a doctor's prescription. Vaping is the act of inhaling a vapour produced by an e-cigarette or electronic vaporizer. The vapour can contain nicotine and other substances and may expose users to chemicals and toxins which are harmful to health. The devices are small and can be easily hidden in a pocket or bag. The most popular disposable vapes resemble large USB sticks or highlighter pens as pictured.



The NSW Department of Education has advised schools that students should not bring ecigarettes or e-cigarette accessories onto school premises or use them during school-based activities. Consistent with Department of Education and school policy - vaping, selling or being in the possession of e-cigarettes will result in our students being reported to their parents and may result in suspension.

We are asking parents to be informed about this ongoing concern and to speak to their children about making positive decisions. Additional information to support parents and students can be found at

Attendance and Lateness

Whole day school attendance is extremely important. Research shows that students who miss school regularly are at a much higher risk of leaving school early and not being able to find employment as well as not reaching their full academic potential. One of the things that the school is focusing on for the next few years is an improvement in attendance. Students are expected to attend school at least greater than 90% of the time. The Department of Education has set our school a target around improved attendance. Please endeavor to send your child to school every day and only keep your child at home if they are genuinely sick. Together we can give our children the education they deserve. Please also note that school starts at 8.50am each day. Students should be aiming to get to school at 8.30am to make sure they are on time.

The Barber Shop – Fades and Braids

The Fades and Braids program works with our community partners at Information and Cultural Exchange (ICE). The successful program runs once a week, teaching our students the importance of effective communication, customer service, taking pride in their work, engaging with their learning as well as improving their behaviour and attendance.

Students are mentored and guided bv professionals on how to cut, style and braid hair. The program is for both boys and girls and was recently showcased on the Channel 9 News. A new outdoor gym is being built and this should be ready for use by the beginning of Term 3.

From The Deputy Principal

Dear parents and students,

I believe that student success relies heavily on behaviour attendance, positive and а commitment to learning. In light of this, it is of paramount importance that all students attend school regularly and make a strong commitment to their learning. If your daughter or son is away from school for any reason, you (the parent) must supply the school with a note explaining your child's absence. Satisfactory attendance is calculated at 90% and we as a school are striving to improve the minimum standard for all students at Fairfield High School.

I would like to remind all parents that school starts at 8:50am and we expect all students to be punctual. Often, students blame late buses, trains or parents driving them to school too late. These excuses are not acceptable as lateness eats into valuable learning time. As parents, please ensure that your children are not late to school. If your child arrives late, a note is required to explain the lateness.

Term 2 was a very busy term for both staff and students. The semester one assessment period for years 7-12 has taken place and reports are being written across the school. It is very important that communication is open and productive between teachers and parents, as this is the vehicle to support and improve learning. Many hours of marking and report writing are put into very individualised and specific pointers that may assist in your child's learning journey.

Fairfield High School held a Parent/Teacher evening this year. If you missed this one, I encourage all parents to attend and engage in discussions around your child's progress at the next one.

Subject Selection for 2023

Both Year 8 and Year 10 had some important decisions to make this term in regards to the electives they select for next year. These decisions should have been considered ones, as they become the subjects that students attain their RoSA and HSC certificates in. Students had the opportunity to participate in a 'subject market' where they were issued with course overviews and were provided with the opportunity to ask the teachers who teach these courses questions and discuss the best options for their chosen career paths. A successful 'transition evening' was held on 7th June 2022 where students and their parents attended and subject selection forms were submitted. The evening outlined the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) expectations of all students as they undertake this next step in their educational journey.

Teaching and Learning at FHS

High quality teaching and learning is of the highest priority at Fairfield High School. Our teachers have been very excited to get back into the classroom to provide engaging lessons that meet the diverse learning needs of all our students so they can achieve both academic and social improvements. We have been very busy running programs that develop the skills of both our teachers and students to improve learning.

Testing

Our students have been involved in a wide range of tests in the first half of this year with the purpose of:

• providing teachers with a snapshot of the literacy and numeracy skills that the students demonstrate.

• helping teachers identify students who may require additional support with the development of key literacy and numeracy skills which are needed to access learning across the curriculum.

• informing teacher planning and programming to meet the learning needs of all students.

Year 7 students participated in Best Start Year 7 reading, writing and numeracy and NAPLAN online testing. Year 7 students attend focused Literacy and Numeracy classes. These classes help them develop targeted skills that are identified by this testing data in areas such as reading to write, creating and editing persuasive responses, and arithmetic and multiplication strategies.

Year 8 students participated in Check-in reading, writing and numeracy assessments and PAT Writing online testing.

Year 9 students participated in NAPLAN online testing.

Year 7 and 9 Naplan results will be available to parents from August onwards.

HSC minimum standard tests. Year 10 have completed the online HSC minimum standards tests. Once students achieve success in Level 3 or higher for the online reading, writing and numeracy tests, they will not need to attempt the

tests again. Those who still need to achieve level 3 and above will be provided with multiple opportunities into Year 11 and 12. The Intensive Learning and Support Program teachers will provide these students with additional support as needed. High Potential and Gifted Education Students

The NSW Department of Education has released the High Potential and Gifted Education (HPGE) Policv which promotes engagement and challenge for every student, regardless of background, in every school across intellectual, creative, social-emotional and physical domains. At Fairfield High School we are committed to supporting every student in achieving their educational potential. through talent development opportunities and differentiated teaching and learning practices that ensure their specific learning and wellbeing needs are met. At the end of this term HPGE identified students in year 7 and 8 Blue classes will develop SMART goals. These goals will be shared with their teachers to help challenge and guide them. "Achievement is most positively affected by students and teachers setting challenging goals that are relevant to the students' level of abilities and achievement." (Richard M. Cash, Ed.D.)



Feedback

Fairfield High School is implementing a wholeschool feedback strategy with the aim of empowering our students to become selfregulators; making more explicit changes to their work. The Quality Teaching and learning team, comprised of 15 dedicated Fairfield High School Teachers, meet regularly to participate in Professional Learning to develop and discuss teaching and learning strategies. We aim to encourage our students to have a growth mindset, understanding that mistakes are an opportunity to learn by seeking answers from their teachers, peers and self-reflection.



Year 11 and 12 Teacher Student Conferencing is one way we are developing our students' self-reflection skills. Our first conference for Year 12 was held in Week 4. Students discussed their report results with their teachers, using the conference feedback form to explore their learning strengths, areas that need improvement and practical ways they can make these improvements. The Year 11 Teacher-Student Conference will be held Week 10, Monday the 27th of June from 2:30pm – 4:30pm



Parent Teacher night is also a valuable source of feedback for our students. We encourage parents to get involved in this event to discuss their child's Semester 1 achievements, areas to improve and ways we can work together to support this improvement.

Professional Learning

Term 1 and 2 have been a busy time for the professional development of staff. After COVID put face-to-face professional learning on hold for a couple of years, staff were back working collegially and participating in learning to update knowledge and pedagogy.

Staff Development Days 1 and 2 focused on completing CPR, anaphylaxis and other mandatory training for both teaching and non-Teaching staff. Staff Development Day 3 saw staff engage in training called BehavAbility run by Ian Luscombe. The training highlighted practical, school and individual behaviour whole management strategies that link positive psychology with emotional education to enable schools to create consistent, predictable, nurturing and high expectation cultures.

Empowered Hour

This year, we also ran two after school Professional Learning sessions called 'Empowered Hours'. These sessions offered one hour of intensive learning on school specific needs that align with the School Improvement Plan for 2021-2024.

Term 1 saw the Vesna Veljkovic (Head Teacher EAL/D), Catherine Elep (EAL/D Faculty) and Stephen O'Connell (Head Teacher IEC) present on the Differentiation of Assessment Tasks. Staff were asked to bring an assessment task to the session and work on adapting the task to suit the EAL/D needs of the students at Fairfield High School.

In Term 2, Monica Ghaly, Corrine McKay and Caitlin Stibbard from the LaST Faculty presented a session on Inclusive Classrooms. The session focused on supporting staff to understand, practise and implement effective modification strategies, to provide staff with the necessary and relevant tools to confidently support students with learning needs within the classroom.



Early Career Teachers

Our early career teachers have also been engaging in targeted sessions with the Head Teacher Secondary Studies. These sessions have revolved around administration, organisation and behaviour management. The sessions allow our new teachers to contribute to collegial discussions around their teaching practice and give staff the opportunity to apply and give feedback to improve their knowledge and practice.

Here are some work samples from English students in Year 9, who recently completed a visual narrative, that complimented their study of the text <u>American</u> Born Chinese.





Some of our Year 8 students wrote outstanding analytical pieces for their film study, and below are a couple of excerpts from two students; Kelly Vuong and Ivy Huynh. Congratulations to Kelly for receiving full marks for that very difficult task of writing an analytical essay on the film <u>Remember the Titans.</u>

Through Yakin's use of **anaphora**, and emphasis on the word 'fight and fighting', this indicates that it will never end until they make it right. The setting recognises and reflects the historical allusion that changed American history during the 20th century. As a result, the Gettysburg foundation is the catalyst for change, the significant movement provokes change and the graves are shown to be the levelling factor, being equivalent to the football field. Furthermore, rhetoric. through through his the characterisation of Boone, Yakin draws parallels between the battlefields and the football field, which is synonymous with the direct comparison between the soldiers that fought and died, to the football team to fight and win.

A lower angle shot of coach Boone brings a sense of helplessness and vulnerability toward the players. Accompanied by the low angle, Coach Boone verbalises, "I don't care if you like each other right now, but you will respect each other. And maybe - I don't know, maybe we'll learn to play this game like men...." representing the developing ambition amongst the players.

Finally, a excerpt from Noora Yaqow's recent Year 12 English Advanced essay on the Textual Conversation between William Shakespeare's King Richard III and Al Pacino's Looking For Richard.

Shakespeare's depiction of Richard, who works underlying Machiavellian conceal his to intentions throughout the play, is established through dramatic irony in his opening soliloguy of the "plots I have laid to set my brother and the king in deadly hate," whereby Shakespeare has Richard's deviousness and "devilish plots" foreshadow his decimation, displayed by the Elizabethan worldview that the immoral acts of deceit and manipulation are ultimately destructive, allowing his audience to anticipate and morbidly observe his malevolence.



Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

NSW Department of Education

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as uniustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
 Helps students learn the importance of punctuality
- and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
 Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
 being required to attend a recognised religious
- holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

 Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.



E-Cigarettes



If you, or a parent you know, is concerned about the risks of electronic cigarette use in teenagers, the following information provides you with the facts.

WHAT ARE E-CIGARETTES?

Also known as cuvies, stigs and vapes an e-cigarette is in simple terms a device that heats a flavoured liquid (popular flavours include; strawberry, watermelon, peach and creme brulee) to an aerosol which can be inhaled. The device can be disposable (often allowing for up to 600 inhalations) or it can be reusable by refilling the device with e-liquid or a pod (containing e-liquid). Recent data shows an increase in use of e-cigarettes over the past three years, with one in five students aged 16–17, trying e-cigarettes.

HOW DO THEY WORK?

E-cigarettes produce an aerosol by using a battery to heat a liquid. This liquid is sometimes called "e-juice," "e-liquid," "vape juice," or "vape liquid." The liquid used in e-cigarettes is made up of flavours, chemicals and often contains nicotine.

Users inhale e-cigarette aerosol into their lungs. Bystanders can also breathe in this aerosol when the user exhales it into the air.

WHAT DO THEY LOOK LIKE?

E-cigarettes come in a variety of shapes and sizes. They can be as small as a USB and even look like one, they can also look like pens, highlighters or cigarettes.



WHY ARE THEY UNSAFE/RISKY/DANGEROUS?

E-cigarette liquid is made up of different chemicals. These chemicals can include:

- Nicotine (although illegal without a prescription in Australia, many disposable devices that youth are using contain nicotine.)
- Flavorings such as diacetyl, a chemical linked to a serious lung disease
- Volatile organic compounds
- Cancer-causing chemicals
- Heavy metals such as nickel, tin, and lead

Studies have also shown that kids who use e-cigarettes are more likely than their peers to go on to smoke cigarettes.

Effects of nicotine on youth:

- Nicotine can harm the developing teenage brain.¹ The brain keeps developing until about age 25.
- Using nicotine as a teenager can harm the parts of the brain that control attention, learning, mood, and impulse control.¹
- Each time a new memory is created or a new skill is learned, stronger connections or synapses are built between brain cells. Young people's brains build synapses faster than adult brains. Nicotine changes the way these synapses are formed.
- Using nicotine as a teenager may also increase risk for future addiction to other drugs.¹

WHAT CAN I DO AS A PARENT?

The KEY is talking about e-cigarettes with your child, preparing yourself with the facts and role modelling with a smoke and e-cigarette free environment. KEY considerations for talking about e-cigarettes:

K: Know the facts or where to find them from a reputable source

- E: Engage on the topic in a relaxed and easy way. Use the cues around you, a note home from the school, a person using a device, a story on the news as the way into the conversation and the way to keep talking about it ongoing.
- Y: You know your child, communicate with them in ways that work for you and allow you to provide them with the right information to make healthy decisions.

Important note - if you are concerned that your child may be experiencing nicotine withdrawal please speak to your pediatrician or doctor.

The health effects of tobacco smoking and e-cigarette use

Effect of tobacco smoking on your health:

- Smoking is the main cause of **preventable** death and disease in Australia!
- Smoking is linked to **40+ diseases**, including lung cancer, liver cancer, emphysema and eye and mouth diseases.
- When you smoke, extremely harmful chemicals enter your body and can reach your heart, brain and go everywhere your blood flows.
- Smoking affects how you look and feel.

Effects of e-cigarette use on your health:

- E-cigarettes contain chemicals that **haven't been tested for safety** when inhaled into the lungs.
- E-cigarette makers don't list all their ingredients and it can be hard to find out what they are. Some e-cigarettes contain nicotine even when they are labelled "nicotine free".
- Nicotine is highly addictive and can harm your brain development.
- Studies have shown that young people who use e-cigarettes are **more likely to smoke** and become addicted to cigarettes in adulthood.

<u>Smoking can:</u>

- Stop your lungs growing properly and make you less fit.
- Give you tooth decay and sore or bleeding gums.
- Make you wheeze or trigger an asthma attack.
- Cause addiction to the drug nicotine.

Using e-cigarettes can:

- Make you wheeze or trigger an asthma attack.
- Make you moody, anxious and irritable.
- Expose your lungs, body and brain to harmful chemicals.
- Cause addiction to the drug nicotine.

Smoking and e-cigarettes affect your brain:

Your brain is particularly sensitive to the effects of nicotine. Your brain is still developing until you are about 25 years old, so if you use nicotine your brain may not be able to properly develop. This means that you are more likely to develop anxiety and mood disorders.

What does all this mean for you?

Smoking or using e-cigarettes:

- is bad for the health of your body, lungs and brain
- costs a lot of money and can mean you miss out on doing fun activities
- exposes you to addictive and unknown substances
- gives you yellow teeth and unhealthy gums.

By choosing not to smoke or use e-cigarettes you are setting yourself up for a healthier and happier life!

IEC Deputy Principal's Report

The first half of 2022 pleasingly saw the lifting of COVID restrictions and the much anticipated return to the resumption of our normal school activities at Fairfield Intensive English Centre including, the return of the Refugee Health nurse, our weekly Activities, excursions and parent programs. From Term 3, we will also resume the IEC Homework Centre.

I am very pleased to report that Fairfield IEC has enrolled over 150 students since the start of 2022. Our enrolments currently stand at 180 students and we continue to process new enrolments on a daily basis. This is welcome news for Fairfield IEC, Fairfield HS and our partner schools as well as the Intensive English Program following two years of very low enrolments due to COVID-19. Since the beginning of Term 1, we have seen new enrolments from Iraq, Syria, Vietnam, Samoa and Ukraine, all of whom have settled in very well and become accustomed to new school routines. Congratulations to all the office staff for the extremely efficient way the enrolments have been processed.

With increased enrolments and the lifting of the COVID restrictions, we

were able to resume our weekly Activities program aimed at assisting our students with their settlement. Our are students currently participating in songwriting, drama, drumming, sport, art and other welfare activities that are being led by our community partners from STARTTS, Australian Literacy and Numeracy Foundation, Creating Chances, Department of Justice and PYT Fairfield. On behalf of Fairfield IEC. I would like to thank our community partners for the great service that they provide to our students. Our staff also organised exciting excursions for their classes to different sites of Sydney such as Manly, the NSW Art Gallery, Opera House and many others so that our new students could experience learning outdoors and to enjoy each other's company in a more relaxed atmosphere.

It is great to see the Elaine McGowan Learning Centre being utilised by our students and staff. All our staff have been trained on how to navigate through the facility and English teachers accompany their classes to the Elaine McGowan Learning Centre at least once a week for specific library skills development. In addition, students have the opportunity to engage in silent reading and to borrow books every lunchtime.




Electrical Circuits Experiment

At the IEC, the primary objective of students is to learn English. This is reflected in all Key Learning Areas, and while it is an immersive environment for language learning, students often do not have opportunities to participate in hands-on activities.

This term, class 3A has been learning about electrical circuits. They have assembled a range of series and parallel circuits using various wires and household objects. Students skilfully interpreted electrical circuit theory and communicated the task to their peers, who actively listened and constructed the circuits.

Additionally, the students have documented this experiment through their scientific investigative practical reports. Prior to completing the students jointly constructed component, an investigative report hypothesising that they would complete various circuits within a certain time frame. The experiment yielded mixed results and the students were keen to further develop their scientific writing. An excellent achievement for 3A!



Student Welfare Program - Settling In

Settling In is a welfare program designed for a group of newly-arrived refugee students. It aims to help students adjust to life in Australia by discussing the emotional experiences of migration. During the nine-week program, students learnt to:

- · talk about their feelings;
- · normalise feelings of discontent;
- · form positive interpersonal relationships; and
- · learn constructive intrapersonal coping strategies

The Settling-In program ran for one period a week. It was facilitated by the School Counsellor, Adam Gaal, and classroom

teacher, Ms Ung, both of whom have received special training in the delivery of this program. The cohort from Term 2 enjoyed the program and has benefited greatly from learning coping strategies to assist with settling into a new country.



2A and 3A Drama Production

In the final week of Term 1, Ms Ung guided IEC classes 2A and 3A to independently compose and perform plays in small groups. Many of these students had just enrolled in the IEC and had been exposed to narratives and narrative elements for the first time. Their showcase demonstrated how deeply they understood the task.

The classes performed in full costume to Mr O'Connell, Ms Sarac, Ms Aldover, Ms Redondi and Mr Giakoumatos. The students were creative, confident and supportive of each other as they stepped out of their comfort zones in front of teachers they had never met. The students had a fantastic day and their teachers were proud of them for their excellence.

IEC Garden Club

The aim of the garden club is to educate students about sustainable practices, such as composting food and garden waste, preparing and enriching soil, planting and maintaining crops, harvesting produce, as well as cooking and eating what is grown in the garden.

Sydney Eyecare Services (SES)

During Term 2, Sydney Eyecare Services collaborated with Fairfield IEC to bring its fully equipped mobile optometry clinic to our school. The visiting team consisted of AHPRA registered optometrists conducting eye checkups for two days. The eye-testing program was bulk-billed to Medicare.

The services included:

clarity of vision assessment for distance and near

internal and external eye health assessment

eye co-ordination, binocular vision, depth perception and colour vision assessment
testing report sent to parents

All students' reports were confidentially discussed with their families and followed up where necessary. We are very fortunate to have such services and facilities offered at the IEC to ensure all our students remain healthy in order to receive the best education.

Healthy vision is important for your child's educational, physical and social development and to help them reach their full learning potential.

Did you know that 1 in 5 children have an undetected vision problem?

With 80 per cent of all learning experienced through vision, it is no surprise that children with undetected vision problems often fail to progress well in school.

Children's vision can change dramatically from one year to the next, so a thorough eye examination is recommended to ensure your child has healthy vision.

Feel Good Program: Feel Good is a group program for newly-arrived refugee students which aims to achieve the following:

- learn to identify and label emotions/core feelings;
- explore both the individual and universal experiences of emotions;
- link emotional regulation to positive relationships and overall sense of wellbeing;
- normalise the intensity and frequency of human emotions;
- ✓ explore the key purposes and use of emotions in our lives;
- develop awareness of the need to take personal responsibility for the utilisation and expression of emotions;
- create social connections around common experiences and build on abilities to communicate and empathise with each other;
- reflect on how our emotions influence our behaviour/actions, as well as how we interact with others;
- establish link between emotional regulation, stress and self-awareness;
- ✓ process some of the experiences that deplete our self-esteem and encourage help-seeking behaviours;
- establish awareness around selfcompassion;
- ✓ manage stress using self-care, physical exercise and team work.

The program runs for two periods a week. It is facilitated by Ms. Berbary who has received special training in the delivery of this program. Students enjoyed the program and have benefited greatly from learning coping strategies to assist with stress management. Students have also engaged in a variety of activities that have assisted them in selfconfidence, team building and responsibility.
