FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

It has been a privilege returning to Fairfield High School as Relieving Principal. The students, staff and families that I have met have collectively been very welcoming over the few weeks that I have been here, and I look forward to continuing to reconnect with the Fairfield community.

Our students have continued to engage in their learning throughout this term and it has been pleasing to see students working diligently in their classes and completing quality assessments for their various subjects to demonstrate course outcomes. To see our students do well and realise their academic and educational potential, as a school, we encourage all students to commit to their learning, to seek ongoing feedback from their class teachers to support growth, and to give their best to every learning opportunity that is afforded them every day at Fairfield High School.

Maintaining regular school attendance is important to support students achieving their academic best and to increase their career and life options. Students who miss more than 10% of school are likely to see a decline in their learning and academic achievement. When students attend every day, learning becomes easier, and our students become more confident; both of which help with building and maintaining positive friendships and social interactions with peers. We therefore ask our families to continue working with us to ensure students are attending school every day, are arriving on time, and that their attendance rate is 90% or higher to support continued growth in learning.

As a school, we are proud of the many success stories of our students. One such story relates to our Stage 6 VET Hospitality students who, as part of the Class Chefs program by Southwest Connect, had the opportunity to take over the Cucina 105 restaurant in Liverpool for one night and create a delicious three course meal with the support and guidance of the Head Chef. Our students were exceptional, demonstrated excellent customer service, and created exquisite meals, which they served to staff and families who attended. I'd like to acknowledge the owners and management of Cucina 105 and Southwest Connect for the valuable opportunity and experience you have given our students. I'd also like to acknowledge the time and dedication of Mr Singh, (Relieving Head Teacher TAS), Ms Chehaita, (Hospitality Teacher), and Ms Fisk (TAS School Administrative Officer) in supporting the organisation of this program, and your ongoing commitment to our students.



On Thursday 8th June we welcomed our Executive Director, Kay Rigas, and Director Educational Leadership, Lisa Porter, to our school. Kay and Lisa met with our new Relieving Principal, Natalie Isakov, as well as with students from our Student Representative Council. TEACHING AND LEARNING NEWS

Mrs Raphaelle Brown, Head Teacher Teaching and Learning, has gained another job in the Department of Education. This is a temporary position. In her absence, Ms Kelly Lightfoot is the Relieving Head Teacher, Teaching and Learning. I welcome Ms Lightfoot who brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to the role. The aim is to support teachers to support students in their learning.

Many ongoing initiatives and programs enhance and further develop our students' learning:

Our High Potential and Gifted program is underway with all students, Years 7 – 12, having their Smart Goals reviewed. Teachers can access the students' goals to adjust the learning experiences for them. Teachers are continuing to provide the students with engaging and challenging learning opportunities.

The Effective Feedback program has been implemented in 2022 and is continuing. Teachers have been using strategies in the classroom which give students feedback on their understanding of the concepts studied.

Year 11 and Year 12 Student Teacher Conferences and teachers' comments in the academic reports are additional forms of feedback employed.

There is a whole school focus on reading, comprehension, number sense and geometry in Years 7-10 including the Year 7 Literacy and Numeracy classes. Results from external testing provide the data for the continued review of the targeted strategies taught in junior programs across the school.

Aboriginal perspectives are mandatory and are being addressed in the Key Learning Areas through faculty programs, teaching strategies and resources. A yarn circle is being developed for all teachers and students to use. Various celebrations, including National Sorry Day, Reconciliation Week and Naidoc Week were also participated in by students.

 The COVID Intensive Learning and Support Program (ILSP) has continued running in Semester 1 to support our Year 10, 11 and 12 students in achieving the HSC Minimum Standards. Achieving passes in the Minimum Standards tests enables students to be awarded the HSC. There has been a significant increase in students obtaining their HSC as a result of this program.

The staff working in the school's Homework Centre help students with homework and assessment tasks. The Homework Centre is frequented by many students after school.

These programs support student wellbeing and aim to help students to identify their individual strengths and characteristics, which are key to developing resilience to overcome life challenges and complex situations that students may encounter.

In addition to wellbeing, FHS has been working hard to support strong attendance patterns for our students, in line with the Department's attendance policy, and this will be an ongoing focus throughout the year. PROFESSIONAL LEARNING

Staff Development Day Days 1, 2 and 3:

Staff Development Days 1 and 2 focused on completing CPR, anaphylaxis and other mandatory training for both teaching and non-teaching staff. The focus of Staff Development Day 2 was the Feedback Strategy run by Raphaelle Brown and the Quality Teaching and Learning Team. The training outlined various feedback strategies, effective feedback, the power of 'yet' and future planning for feedback at FHS.

Staff Development Day 3 had a focus on FHS Aboriginal Education Planning and Teaching Aboriginal Cultures and Histories. Staff engaged in practical and theoretical workshops and activities that allowed staff to build empathy and discover new teaching and learning strategies that are inclusive of First Nations People. These sessions were run by the Aboriginal Education Team led by the Deputy Principal, Kim O'Sullivan.

Empowered Hours:

This year, we also run two after school Professional Learning sessions called 'Empowered Hour'. These sessions offer one-hour intensive learning on school specific needs that align with the School Improvement Plan for 2021-2024.

The Empowered Hour for Term 1 was run by Raphaelle Brown (Head Teacher Teaching and Learning). The session was directed towards Future Focused Learning and upskilled teachers with new and engaging ICT resources that they can use within their lessons.

In Term 2, Deputy Principals, Deanna Knapman and Gus Avgoustou, presented a session on resume writing and applying for permanent or promotion positions. Staff were walked through a step by step process of what is involved in creating a successful CV.

Early Career Teachers:

Our early career teachers have also been engaging in targeted sessions with the Head Teacher Secondary Studies. The sessions have revolved around administration, organisation and behaviour management. The sessions allow our new teachers to contribute to collegial discussions around their teaching practice and give staff the opportunity to receive feedback to improve their knowledge and practice.

Head Teacher Secondary Studies Report

I would like to start by congratulating two staff members who have taken on leadership roles in 2023.

Mr Bailey (HSIE) was appointed as a Peer Support Coordinator and Ms Kezic (PDHPE) was appointed as a Middle School Coordinator. Mr Bailey's role as Peer Support Coordinator is to develop and implement the Peer Support Australia program which aims at making the transition from primary school to high school an easier process for students. Ms Kezic's role as Middle School Coordinator is to support Mr Bailey but also foster the transition by developing relationships with feeder primary schools and build on the Peer Support program into the Middle School years.

<u>'O Week'</u>

Ms Kezic coordinated 'O Week' as Year 7's first week in high school. Students were involved in Peer Support workshops that were run by Mr Bailey and the Year 11 Peer Support Leaders. Workshops were also run by staff at Fairfield High School to provide Year 7 with important information regarding "high school life". 'O Week' ran for four full days. The students settled into high school with ease as the program allowed our Peer Support Leaders to shine. 'O Week' appeared to be effective with only minor tears, which are to be expected, with such big change.

Peer Support

In addition to the sessions that ran in 'O Week', Mr Bailey and the Peer Support Leaders ran a weekly Peer Support Session throughout Term 1. Students explored topics relevant to settling into high school through practical activities and discussions. Students enjoyed the practical hands on workshops and enjoyed developing a relationship with their older peers. Congratulations to our Year 11 Peer Support Leaders who demonstrated maturity and leadership skills, but also the ability to be flexible and creative when sessions weren't going to "plan". In Term 3, we will start the process of training Year 10 students to be our 2024 Peer Support leaders. The students will be involved in a two-day training session and learn the skills to lead and facilitate the Peer Support Program in 2024. If you have any questions, please see Mr Bailey, Ms Kezic or Ms Hayes (Head Teacher Secondary Studies).

In 2024, we are aiming to develop the Peer Support Program with the goal of developing a similar program amongst our SEU students. To allow this to occur, key staff will receive extra training from external companies including Rock and Water. Our aim is to continue to build not only the skill set of our students, but also the skills of staff involved in the delivery of these programs.

Year 7 Peer Support Check In

During Week 3, Term 2, the Peer Support Program continued to be delivered to Year 7. Students were able to "check in" with their leaders and ask any relevant questions. They also explored positive relationships and the impact internally negative relationships may have on their peers. This will continue each term and we will explore topics relevant to the group of students at the time whilst continuing to foster the relationships amongst Year 7 and their older peers.

Year 8 Peer Support

For the first time we have extended our Peer Support Program to Year 8. During Week 4, Term 2 Year 8 were involved in a double period practical workshop which, similar to Year 7, explored positive relationships. Mr Bailey was supported by the Year 8 Year Advisors, Ms Kezic and Mr Bartlett (PDHPE). This ran over two days and finished with the all the boys working with Mr Bartlett to engage in a sport based session to demonstrate the skills and qualities of positive relationships. The girls worked with Ms Kezic to create mottos for the year group focusing on positive relationships. This will continue once a term throughout 2023, and we aim to build on this in 2024.

Year 7 Showcase

Tuesday 9th May saw faculties represented at the Year 7 Showcase. KLAs demonstrated hands-on activities that Year 7 engaged in with staff to showcase to parents. We aim to build this in 2024 to include all Stage 4 (Year 7 and 8) to showcase the work of our staff and students. Thank you to all staff involved and parents who attended the event. Thank you again to Ms Kezic who coordinated this event.

Academic Challenge

Tuesday 30th May saw students from Fairfield Public School, Fairfield West Public School, Yenorra Public School, Villawood North Public School and Canley Heights Public School work with our Science, Mathematics and PDHPE faculties. The 2022 winner was Canley Heights, but in Term 2, 2023 the winner was Fairfield Public School. Students were involved in a number of activities which tested their ability to demonstrate their practical skills, and mathematical and scientific knowledge. Thank you to Ms Arunachalam (Science), Mr Johnson (PDHPE) and Mr Grace (Mathematics) for coordinating the Academic Challnege. Also, congratulations to Ms Kezic who coordinated the event. Next term will be coordinated by our CAPA, LOTE and TAS faculties. We aim to extend the program in 2024 to include a larger number of our feeder primary schools to strengthen these partnerships.

Subject Selection

Year 8 and 10 students have been involved in a number of workshops to aid with the transition into Stage 5 (Year 9 and 10) or Stage 6 (Year 11 and 12). During Week 4 and 5 students were involved in information sessions and were addressed by Deputy Principals and the Head Teacher Secondary Studies. They then viewed a video from KLAs on the courses they have on offer for students in 2024/2025. Students were also provided with information on the expectation of studies in Stage 5 and Stage 6. On Tuesday 6th June, parents and students were involved in an additional information session and had the opportunity to speak to KLA representatives. Student will now select the elective courses they will study for the next two years. Year 10 will also be involved in the All My Own Work program which is a requirement to be enrolled into Stage 6 studies. This will be run by the Head Teacher Secondary Studies.

HSC Timetable 2023

Year 12 students have been provided with an email from Ms Hayes with instructions on how to access their personal HSC timetable through NESA Students Online. Students will need to activate their Students Online account. If they require any help they are able to see Ms Hayes.

Early Career Teachers

As part of NESA requirements to complete their Accreditation, Fairfield High School runs a program to support our Early Career Teachers to further develop their skills and support the process of gaining proficiency. This term, I have been lucky to work with three teachers who have achieved proficiency with NESA and I would like to send congratulations to Mr Bailey, Ms Stibbard (LaST) and Ms Tran (Maths). All three teachers demonstrate their skill set daily, and it was a pleasure to read through their Accreditation which highlighted the effort they go to, to ensure the students of Fairfield High School are working towards achieving their personal best. This program will continue with additional Early Career Teachers who will receive professional learning and support for their Accreditation which will focus on the organisational and administrative skills required as a teacher.

Year 7 2024

We have started the process of communicating with families and our feeder primary schools in preparation for Year 7 2024. We will have programs and contact with primary schools in Term 2 and 3 in preparation for our Orientation Day for all Year 6 students on Tuesday, 28th November. This will be organised by Ms Kezic and our 2024 Year Advisors. Parents of our 2024 Year 7 students will be invited to spend the afternoon meeting key personnel before collecting their children after their first day at Fairfield High School. More information will be communicated with families in the near future.

HSC 2024 Expectations Parent Information

During Term 3, 2023, Year 12 2024 (current Year 11) will have a compulsory Parent Information session run by Ms Hayes looking at expectations and procedures regarding the HSC, major works, illness misadventure and the N Award process. More information will be provided to the students closer to the date.

Positive Behaviour Learning

CARE Code

Aboriginal Education

This semester Fairfield High School Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students have worked to develop stronger ties to their own culture and to raise awareness about the shared histories, cultures and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples for the whole Fairfield High School community. Our students worked with Aunty Carol to redevelop Fairfield High School's Acknowledgement of Country, working to create a statement that is specific and special to our own school context. With the help of our GAs, our students also planted 12 Gymea Lillies in the garden at the front of the school. These Gymea Lillies, the flower totem of the Darug People on whose land our school is built, now proudly stand in the garden in front of the school. As part of Reconciliation Week 2023, Year 10 student Izack Carter showcased his Yidaki playing skills during formal year assemblies. Izack is self taught since the age of four with his instrument, and this was an amazing opportunity for the whole school to gain an appreciation for his musical and cultural talents. Perhaps the most exciting project that our students have embarked upon this year is the development of our school Yarning Circle. They have been working with Cliodnha - First Nations Officer from Youth Community Greenings - to decide on the placement, design and function of the space, as well as getting their hands dirty removing non-native plants and mulching the garden bed in preparation for planting more natives. Our students are looking forward to continuing to develop our Yarning Circle together throughout the year for the entire FHS community to use as a safe space to build respectful relationships and enrich learning experiences.



We would like to Acknowledge the Cabrogal Clan of the Dharug Nation who are the Traditional Custodians of this land we are living and learning on today. We also pay our respect to the Elders both past, present and emerging. We acknowledge your rich culture and thank you for caring for the Dharug land that the school is built on. Your heritage and traditions are important to us all and we will walk together and continue to respect and care for Country and culture.

WHAT IS CLASS CHEFS?

On June 5th, 25 Hospitality students were involved in the Hospitality Class Chefs Program. So what is the Class Chefs Program?

The "Class Chefs" initiative provides an exciting hands-on learning opportunity for an entire class of VET Hospitality students to take the lead and run a commercial kitchen of a fine dining restaurant, serving members of the general public quality food and beverages, including a three course fine dining menu

South West Connect has partnered with Training Services NSW through their Regional Industry Education Partnerships (RIEP) initiative to deliver Class Chefs in 2023. This is a unique opportunity for Hospitality students to gain real life, commercial experience and work practices, by serving paying customers outside of the school or training facility environment. They will also be co-assessed under the guidance of industry experts and their teacher. The RIEP initiative strengthens connections between industry and schools. RIEP helps students develop the skills they need to get a job by linking what is learned at school and what is needed in the workplace.

Students will encounter the same challenges and pressures faced by most busy fine dining establishments. To achieve a high customer ratio, a subsidised special pricing is charged, allowing more parents, teachers and members of the public to enjoy the experience without it being a huge financial burden. During the Class Chefs event, students can serve over 100 customers within a 3 hour period - comparable with some of the busiest restaurants in Sydney. It allows students to demonstrate strong communication. outstanding teamwork, workplace time management, problem-solving skills and experience working under pressure. These skills are often difficult to demonstrate or master in the classroom yet are crucial in the workplace. The Class Chefs initiative bridges this gap and provides the 'next level' link to industry that students require to succeed beyond school.

Industrial Technology Timber

Stage 5 – Year 9 Timber Class

During Semester 1, Year 9 Timber students had the opportunity to design and construct a kitchen chopping board as one of their practical project assessment tasks. Students consolidated their theory workbook learning of joining timber by practising their drawing and sketching skills in class. Each student was required to create and plan their projects and after discussing them with their class teacher, Mr. Singh, they were allocated Australian hardwood timbers, mainly rock maple and jarrah, to construct their project.

Students took turns and used workshop time to plan, mark-out their timber and carry out widening joints, using the biscuit cutting machine. They used PVA adhesive to glue the timber together and sand the board. Finally, they applied linseed oil as a finishing agent to complete their project.

IEC DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Term 2 2023

I am very pleased to report that Fairfield IEC has a current enrolment of 195 students and would like to extend a warm welcome to all our new families.

This semester, IEC students have excelled academically and

also on the sporting field. Several IEC students achieved great success in the Cross Country competition, resulting in participation at Zone and Regional levels. Congratulations to all these students and their teachers on this remarkable achievement. Please see the specific article in the following pages of this edition of The Bridge.

Our refugee, international and migrant students continue to benefit from the educational, settlement, social and wellbeing programs to support their adjustment and welfare needs through our Homework Centre, regular Activities program, excursions, incursions, lunchtime table-tennis and volleyball, and other successful educational programs.

Parents are urged to encourage their child/ren to attend the IEC's Homework Centre, which operates every Tuesday afternoon from 3.15pm-4.15pm in the Elaine McGowan Learning Centre. It is a free service where students are assisted by an IEC teacher and SLSO to complete homework activities or assessment tasks. Students require a permission note, which can be obtained from the IEC office.

It was very pleasing to see an increased number of international students returning to Fairfield IEC in 2023. In Term 1, Fairfield IEC was visited by DE International personnel, who were extremely impressed by the programs and the high levels of support provided to the students by our International Students Coordinators, Ms Redondi (teacher) and Ms Chau (SASS). Most international students study at the IEC 20 weeks. In addition to English, they study maths, science, history, geography, drama, physical education, Australian studies, visual art and computer studies. They participate in all of our quality wellbeing programs to assist with their settlement, including a special luncheon held every term. Fairfield IEC understands that international students are often studying in Australia away from their families and friends and are therefore supported extensively and highly valued.

The Elaine McGowan Learning Centre in the IEC is now open every day for the second half of lunch, and on some days for the whole of lunch. Students are encouraged to attend and use the space for silent reading, borrowing of books, using the laptops to complete work or to play board games.



Our Parent Orientation and Families in Cultural Transition (FICT) programs have both successfully taken place with a record number of parent attendees, led by Ms Nona, Head Teacher Welfare, and Mr Milad Naisan, FHS Refugee Support Officer. These programs have enabled our parents to learn more about the school, participate in weekly social gatherings and find out about the different local agencies that can support them. This term, IEC parents were also invited to attend a school organised police talk by the Fairfield Police Youth Engagement Officer, which they found to be highly informative and useful.

In Term 2, we welcomed to the teaching staff Ms Truong from The University of Sydney, who chose to complete her internship at Fairfield IEC, as well as Ms Bishop and Ms Warner. All of our permanent, temporary and casual teaching and non-teaching staff make a positive and outstanding contribution to the wellbeing and the teaching and learning at Fairfield IEC and I would like to thank them for their hard work, diligence and fantastic efforts.

The newly elected NSW State Government has recently announced that it will ban mobile phone in schools from Term 4, 2023 in order to increase student engagement and decrease the many issues that arise from students using mobile phones in schools. We will be communicating with all parents in Term 3 to provide more details and to ensure that they understand the new policy, and to seek assistance on ways they can support the school to implement it.

At the end of Term 2, there will be approximately 50 students exiting from the IEC. I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate these students who successfully completed their education in the IEC and are now transitioning to Fairfield High School, other local high schools, TAFE or to the world of work. These students are undoubtedly leaving the IEC with new knowledge and skills that they can now apply to their new settings.

STUDENT WELFARE PROGRAM - SPORT IS FUN PROGRAM

Sport is Fun is a group program for newly arrived refugee students. Physical education and sport not only offer improved health, however, many other benefits as well. The program helped students to increase their motor skills; foster self-discipline; teach teamwork and respect for peers; develop leadership skills; teach necessity of cooperating with others and to strengthen peer relationships. The program was facilitated by Mr Milad Naisan, Refugee Support Officer, and assisted by class teacher, Mr Fayers. Students also built resilience and boosted their confidence, not only physically, but emotionally and psychologically, and benefitted from improved teamwork and problem-solving skills.

STUDENT WELFARE PROGRAM - SEASONS FOR GROWTH

Fairfield IEC and STARTTS presented this program in small groups to select students. This excellent program is based on research that highlights the importance of social support and the need to practise new skills to cope effectively with change and loss. The program focused on issues such as grief, self-esteem, managing feelings, problem solving, decision making, effective communication, and support networks. The Seasons for Growth program ran for eight weeks and was facilitated by trained staff from STARTTS. It concluded with a 'celebration' session involving an excursion. Students thoroughly enjoyed the program and were able to develop skills in dealing with various personal issues in their lives.











Fairfield IEC and STARTTS presented this program to a small group of students. This excellent program is based on research that highlights the importance of creative activities and the need to practise new skills to manage feelings in a healthy and safe way. The activities focused on providing opportunities to try out new ideas and ways of thinking through drawing, visuals, painting, videos, and shared interests. All the IEC students were enthusiastically engaged in two-hour sessions.











MOBILE EYE AND DENTAL CHECKS:

Mobile Health Care and NSW Free Eye collaborated with FHS IEC in Term 2 to bring its fully equipped mobile optometry clinic to our school. The visiting team consisted of AHPRA registered optometrists, coming to conduct eye check-ups. The eye-testing program was bulk-billed to Medicare. The services included: internal and external examination; eye chart test; clarity of vision; eyes cooperation and, retina testing. Overall, many IEC students received eye testing dental services and it was an extremely beneficial and valuable service, which allowed the medical staff to identify as well as treat the students' health care needs. This service is part of a scheme administered by the Department of Human Services, under Medicare. The eye checks were provided by MobilEyes Optometry.

What is the Child Dental Benefits Schedule?

This Scheme is administered by the Department of Human Services under Medicare and provides access to benefits for 2 basic dental services to children aged 2-17 years.

The total benefit entitlement is capped at \$1000 per child over a two year catendar period. The Scheme is meanatested for which the child's household must be in receipt of Family Tax Benefit A or a relevant Australian Government payment.

Activities Program



For the last 15 years, the IEC has run an Activities Program every Wednesday during periods 5 and 6. During this time, a wide range of workshops are held by community partners such as CORE Community Services, STARTTS, Creating Chances, Powerhouse Youth Theatre, Australian Literacy Numeracy Foundation and Legal Aid, to name just a few. In addition, some teachers also design and run workshops, based on interests and previous experiences that they bring to the IEC. Each workshop is designed to take between eight and ten weeks and students get to join a new series of workshops every term. All IEC students, except for the Beginner students, participate in these workshops.

The overall aim of the Activities program is to help support the IEC students with their settlement and wellbeing needs. There are several ways in which this is achieved.

Firstly, the workshops provide our students with a hands-on introduction to some of the programs, and their facilitators, that local community services such as CORE and STARTTS provide. As a result, our students become familiar with the concept of community services, something most of them have not encountered before, and how these services can help our students and their families.

Secondly, it enables students to engage, informally, with Australian culture and expectations through sport, drama, music and art. In addition, some workshops also focus on health, legal rights and responsibilities, and education and career options.

Finally, workshops also provide a welcome change from the focus on language and academic content that our students experience during the school day. Many of our newly arrived students, have had interrupted, and sometimes no, education. For them, learning can sometimes be associated with stress, uncertainty, and confidence issues. The Activities Program provides a space where students can explore and develop other skills, talents and interests. In addition, some of our former students return as facilitators of some of the workshops. They are fantastic role models and show our students that, even though things may seem difficult now, others before them have managed, and are now leading positive and productive lives in Australia.

The Activities program has run for many years and as a result, there is a strong and well-established connection between the IEC and a range of local services. This benefits our students in myriads of ways both while they are at the IEC and well beyond.

YOUTH EMPLOYMENT PLANNING PASSPORT (YEPP) PROGRAM

In Term 1 of this year, several of the IEC's senior students participated in a pilot program run by Settlement Services



International (SSI). The program, called YEPP (Youth Employment Planning Passport), is a federally funded program to support youth in their final years of schooling by helping with their education, training, and employment decisions. Some of the aims of the program include enhancing career pathways that help young people reach their full career potential, and increasing understanding by young people of the skills sought by employers. The YEPP program also seeks to enhance partnership between employers, training providers, schools and community organisations that assist disengaged young people into further learning and work, including jobs in demand.

The participating students engaged in a number of workshops led by a YEPP career advisor, Ms Rahaf Alrifai, who supported them through a five-phase program as they complete their personal career passport. The YEPP careers advisor guided the students through each phase and supported them to access tools and opportunities.

The students had input into what and how they accessed support and were rewarded and acknowledged in the process when they complete various aspects of the program.

The program culminated in a Career Expo, organised by SSI, which catered specifically to the needs of the participating EAL/D refugee students. At this Career Expo, the students engaged with representatives from TAFE and local business stakeholders, giving a them a hands-on experience with some of the post IEC/HS pathways options available to them.

The YEPP program's individual support has been highly effective in successfully engaging all the participants and some of the students have now expressed an interest in taking part in barista and First Aid courses.

Students Welfare Program – Be Well Youth Talk

This group program is designed for newly arrived refugee students, which aims to help students to achieve the following:

- identify and talk about mental health problems;
- share personal experiences;
- discuss avenues available in the community to support mental health;
- identify ways to raise awareness about this challenge.



The program ran for two periods per week and was facilitated by STARTTS staff, the Refugee Support Officer, Milad Naisan, who has received special training in the delivery of this program, along with class teacher, Mr Sassine. The program concluded with a 'celebration' session involving an excursion to the Blue Mountains. As a result, students were able to openly discuss various issues and they are now more comfortable in seeking help to solve various problems.

It was facilitated by Mr Milad Naisan, who has received special training in the delivery of this program, STARTTS staff and classroom teacher, Mr Fayers. Students enjoyed the program and have benefited greatly from learning coping strategies to assist with stress management. Students also engaged in a variety of activities that have assisted them with developing their self-confidence, team building skills and responsibility.

PARENT WELFARE PROGRAM – PARENT ORIENTATION DAY:

Another very successful Parent Orientation Day was held by the Intensive English Centre in Term 1. We had many parents and caregivers attend. Several staff, including our Deputy Principal, Mr Avgoustou, and Head Teacher Welfare, Ms Nona, provided essential information about schooling and the education system in Australia. Information that was delivered included, school counselling and Refugee Health services, workshops from external organisations, high school transition, TAFE and tertiary education. Parents found this to be a highly valuable learning experience and learnt how best to support their child.



PARENT WELFARE PROGRAM - FAMILIES IN CULTURAL TRANSITION (FICT)

The Families in Cultural Transition program (FICT) aims to assist new arrival refugees to settle more easily in Australia. Parents were able to share their stories and concerns in a safe space. The main objectives of the program are: to help families to communicate with each other more effectively in a new cultural environment; explain the changes that affect people's lives during and after migration, and to help people to adjust to these changes; learn about schooling in Australia; give participants an opportunity to discuss difficult or traumatic experiences in their own language in a safe and supportive environment; introduce participants to other families and couples who speak the same language and share similar experiences; learn about free and low cost recreational activities in Sydney.
